We congratulate Dr. Stahl on the success of his dedicated efforts to aid conceptual learning through visualization.

For our part, Brainstorms has provided a unique offering for our readers that has intrigued, challenged, and instructed them on brain function and chemistry. In addition, we have had an opportunity to collaborate with a bright, energetic thought leader who has impressed our readers by demonstrating the power of captivating cartoon-like drawings to shape the way they think about the practice of psychiatry.
